Ken Anderson involved in local, state and national organizations

Ken Anderson, president of the Marshalltown Area Chamber of Commerce, is one busy guy. But he hopes his efforts, and the continued efforts of those he works with will continue to propel the Marshalltown area's economies and citizens forward in an ever-changing world.

After having spent the last 12 years in Marshalltown, he said he has seen numerous changes, many of them good ones. "When I came to town it was a case of a community in transition," he said.

"With the losses of corporate leadership locally and then, shortly after, the influx of our immigrant populations, we had a lot of challenges to face at once." Anderson talked about Marshalltown's continuously changing community dynamic with a positive outlook for the future.

"Someone from my perspective looks at the overwhelming support for the new library, the millions of dollars for renovating our schools, the English-teaching program downtown, the bilingual program at Woodbury (Elementary) and now the passed college referendum," he said. "Those things to me are signs of positive growth, a positive attitude and a lot of momentum looking into the future." Anderson said he is working toward keeping that momentum going, understanding that keeping the community active and vital will take work from the community and from other local entities.

"The biggest thing we're facing right now is becoming involved in a global environment," he said. "That's a huge opportunity for us." He said something he sees hurting Marshalltown is it seems to have lost some of its mystique, or appearance as a community. Curbing that trend and encouraging rich culture and community involvement is bringing that back.

Anderson also mentioned that in the future, the Des Moines metropolitan area and the Marshalltown area will be drawing nearer and nearer and could be becoming more intertwined than ever before.

These things, among others, are the

reasons Anderson feels compelled to do his part in working for the comprehensive benefit of the Marshalltown area.

Some of the ways Anderson is working toward that goal are the numerous committees and boards of which he is a member, both local and at the state and national levels.

Locally, Anderson is focused on bringing culture and learning experiences into the area through working with the Art & Cultural Alliance, which works at cultivating a stronger art and cultural environment.

He is also working on the planning committee with the Martha Ellen Tye Foundation to establish a sustainable community environment. He said more information would be coming shortly about the October event, featuring Michael Kinsley from the Rocky Mountain Institute in Colorado. He is also involved in the Marshall County Coalition for Youth, which has partnered with the United Way to work on an updated community needs assessment - something critical for local organizations seeking grant money.

Much of his current involvement comes at the state level. He is a member of the Iowa Chamber of Commerce Executives Organization where he is able to network, bounce ideas off of others experiencing similar situations. Anderson also serves on the executive committee for the Iowa Chamber Alliance, which features chamber directors from the 15 largest metropolitan areas in Iowa. Here, he works on public policy advocacy. "I think the agenda has been easy to develop among Iowa's cities," he said.

"Many of the issues we face are similar." But he said the point of his involvement in these committees is largely about meeting people he can work with in the future.

Within recent months, Anderson said he has added a couple more groups to his schedule. He serves on the board of directors for the State of Iowa Workforce Development. This, he said is the basis of everything having to do with his line of work.

"Workforce is a critical issue for all of us in Iowa," he said. "If you

don't have workers, you don't have an economy" Anderson also recently joined the Board of the Iowa Council for International Understanding - something he felt relates to the city of Marshalltown. He said that council looks at the ever-changing global environment that is reaching Iowa more and more each year.

He said Marshalltown's largest businesses are global businesses, and Marshalltown's citizens need to understand the importance of better understanding areas outside of central Iowa.

Nationally, he is currently serving on the U.S. Chamber of Commerce Transportation Committee, which addresses an area very critical to Marshalltown. He said when serving on the state and national committees, he is continuously keeping the needs of Marshalltown in mind and looks for ways to adapt ideas locally.

"It all keeps me busy," he said. "But most good things that happen in the community don't just happen by accident. As a Chamber, we need to be involved in those things."

New Marshall County Laborshed Survey now available

Marshall Economic Development Impact Committee (MEDIC) has partnered with Iowa Workforce Development (IWD) to complete a “laborshed” employment study for Marshall County. This study shows the distribution of the workers irrespective of natural or political boundaries, and looks at underemployment, the availability and willingness of current and prospective employees to change employment within the workforce, current and desired occupations, wages, hours worked and distance willing to commute to work.

The estimated total laborforce potential for the Marshall County

laborshed area is 129,537. A variety of U.S. Census Bureau, Bureau of Labor Statistics, Iowa Workforce Development, and private vendor publications and datasets were used to estimate the size and demographic details of this laborshed area.

The results of this laborshed survey show that 83.2% of all the respondents identified themselves as being employed at the time they were contacted. The majority (78.9%) of the employed are working in positions that are considered full-time. Nearly one-tenth (7.7%) of the employed respondents are self-employed. The types of businesses they are operating

include farming, construction or handyman, retail store or child care. The self-employed have been operating their businesses for an average of 23 years.

Over two-thirds (69.4%) of the employed residents in the laborshed area have some level of education/training beyond high school, 4.7% are trade certified, 3.9% have completed vocational training, 12.8% have an associate degree, 30.3% have an undergraduate degree, and 8.9% have a postgraduate/professional degree.

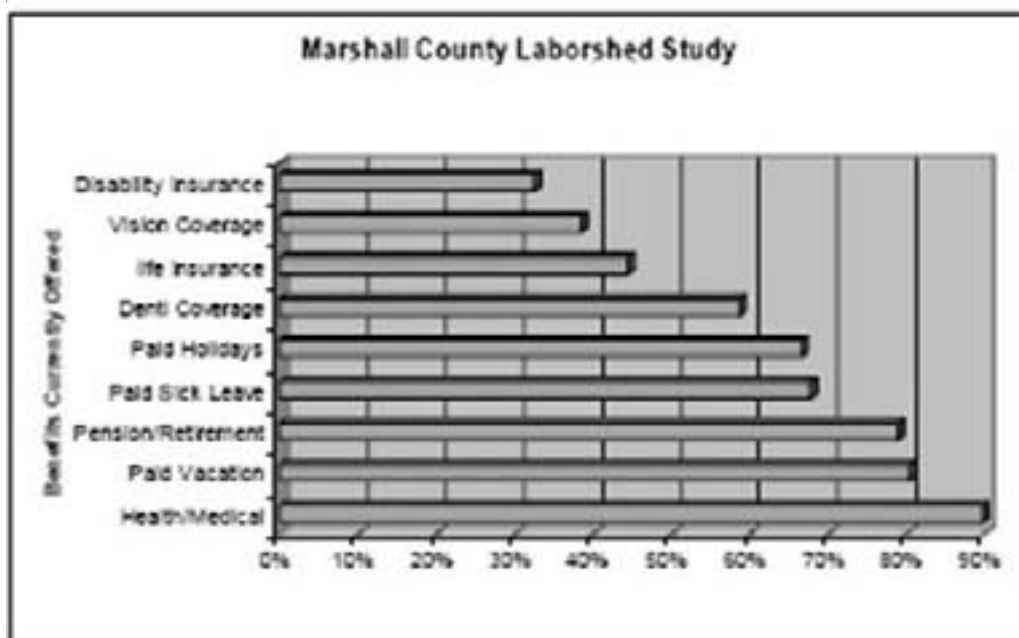
Quick facts about workers that are employed but willing to change employment include: 14.6% are working multiple jobs; currently working an average of 43 hours per week; the average age is 40 years old; 31.5% currently working in professional, paraprofessional, or technical occupations, followed by 20.2% in production, construction, or material handling occupations.

The largest concentration of workers in the Marshall County Laborshed area are employed in the manufacturing industry (15.7%), followed by healthcare and social services (14.2%), and education (12.8%). The lowest number of workers are in transportation, communication, and public utilities (4.7%), and professional services (4.2%).

The survey provided the respondents an opportunity to identify employment benefits they are currently offered. The chart provides the percentage of responses from those that are currently employed. The top nine benefits are shown. The majority (82.5%) of respondents are currently sharing the cost of health/medical premiums with the employer. However, 14.6% of the employers in the area pay the entire cost of insurance premiums as a benefit for their employees.

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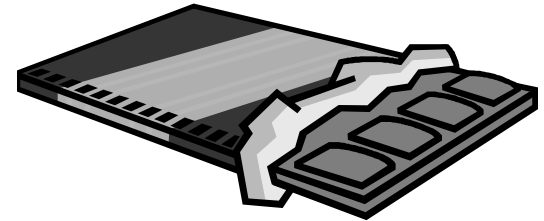

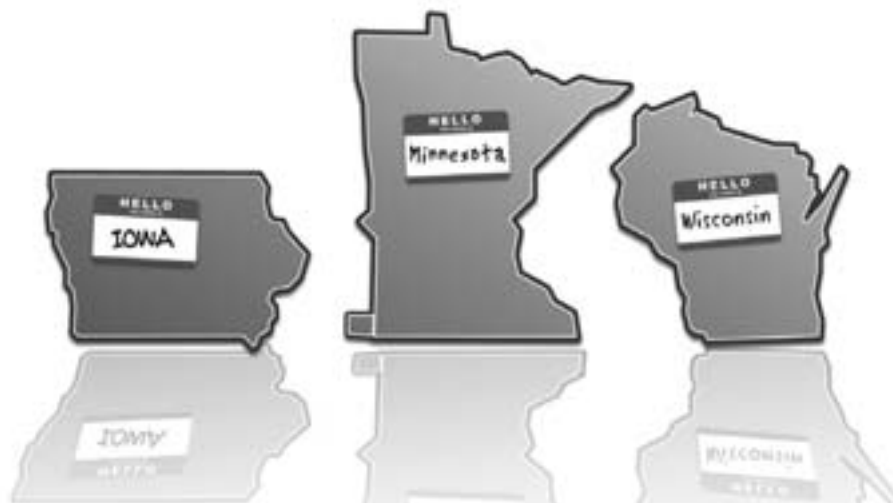
