Citing the company's resiliency following the July 2019 tornado, Chamber President & CEO Lynn Olberding also lauded the company for its diligent role in helping JBS employees who were impacted by the storm, as well as the community as a whole.

"Immediately following the storm," Olberding said, "Plant General Manager Todd Carl kept saying, 'I've got to take care of my people.' And, while they sustained considerable damage to their facility, JBS still continued to help not only their impacted employees, but also the community. Chamber debuts new structure

City of Marshalltown

...a year after weathering the storm

"Change is something we are still dealing with at the City," says City Administrator Jessica Kinser as she reflects on the approaching one-year anniversary of the July 19, 2018 tornado. "Change is difficult, and adapting to a changing job in the midst of a tornado has been very tough."

Yet, there are a number of bright spots. For one, the City applauds the citizens of Marshalltown for their patience. "This has been a year in which one-half of the community did not see any change while another was devastated," Kinser says. "Recovery is a long term process, and it will

continue to require a great deal of patience from everyone."

Another bright spot is having plans to continue with the development and recovery of the community such as the plan for downtown. "The Downtown Master Plan is now complete and helps focus our efforts on restoring and rebuilding a historic district into a vibrant district that is the place to be," Kinser explains.

Recalling the outpouring of support to help Marshalltown is one more bright spot that continues to amaze Kinser. "I saw it immediately on July 19th with public safety personnel coming from all over Marshall County and the region to help...in the immediate needs," she recounts. "Then it turned into people and organizations from all over the country coming to help clean-up neighborhoods. And then it transitioned into other governmental entities, Tama and Toledo, Des Moines, Marshall County, and the Iowa DOT (to name a few), sending their public works personnel to help with the debris pick-up from public areas. It continued with financial and technical assistance from the State for Downtown and housing. The support network we didn't know existed helped us through tough times."

Tax Increment Financing (TIF): A critical tool for local economic development

TIF is one of the few tools available to cities and counties to spur economic development projects and make the necessary investments and reinvestments to infrastructure that enable new growth while also supporting the overall local economy. These projects include improved water and waste water treatment facilities, new roads/repair of existing roads, assistance to upgrade downtown buildings, and the local match necessary to utilize outside assistance programs from other governmental entities. At its core, TIF is a method of reallocating property tax revenues produced by an increase in taxable valuation above a "base valuation" figure within a tax increment area to spur investment by private entities. You are probably asking, "What?" I did when I first heard those words. In fact, I had more questions about our property taxes and public financing systems after hearing that than I did before.

Let's look at a local example. Picture an existing field with a new big box retail store built on it. The taxes generated from the original use (an agricultural field) are still put into the general use categories of all the taxing entities; the new taxes paid after it is built are put towards infrastructure improvements that allow the project to occur. These investments are paid for by the box retailer. In this instance, additional tax revenues

generated by the project are used to expand a road to three lanes and meet the needs of the business. The ancillary effect opens an additional 37 acres for increased development and ultimately additional tax revenue which will lower the tax burden for everyone.

Let's look at an example with numbers. The base tax collected on a project before the improvement is \$5,000. The improvements add valuation that will garner an additional \$4,000 worth of taxes. This \$4,000 is the increment and can be used for the improvements. The tax on the project will eventually be \$9,000. The school, city, county, and college still collect and share the base tax of \$5,000, but will eventually collect and share the additional \$4,000. Nothing is removed from existing general tax funds; ultimately everyone shares in the valuation after the infrastructure improvements have been funded. Those additional taxes received may have never been available had the project not received assistance through TIF.


